

MAKE YOUR TREATMENT DECISIONS CLEAR NOW

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If you don't have a living will or other legal directives on the end-of-life care you want, you can link to those documents at freep.com/prepare.

In the documents, you specify what level of medical care you want in the future, and who you want to make decisions for you if you can't.

In the event you're incapacitated, the documents help loved ones make the decisions you want.

"People should do this because nobody has an automatic right to make health care decisions for someone else," attorney Josh Ard of Williamston said.

Ard said everyone — regardless of age — should consider a living will and designating a patient advocate.
